

Jaime I. Ayala '84

President and CEO of Ayala Land Inc.

Jim Ayala, 47, is Senior Managing Director of Ayala Corporation, the leading business group in the Philippines. Ayala Corporation's publicly listed holdings are Bank of the Philippine Islands (the country's most profitable bank), Globe Telecom (the second largest national telco), Ayala

Land (the market leader in real estate), and Manila Water (the leading water utility). The company also has significant interests in electronics manufacturing, business process outsourcing, and automotive distribution. Jim is also a member of the company's management committee.

Until April of this year, Jim was President of Ayala Land (ALI), which he joined in 2004. Under Jim's leadership, ALI achieved 130% revenue growth and 80% earnings growth over five years. It increased residential revenues 2.5 times on the back of a revamped portfolio of market-leading products and brands; doubled mall and office gross leasable area with exciting new malls and office campuses; successfully launched two new sustainability oriented cities, Bonifacio Global City and Nuvali; and made significant forays into new business lines, such as leisure and tourism, and new geographies, such as Thailand and China.

His other significant positions included: Chairman of the Board of Directors of Cebu Holdings, Inc., Cebu Property Ventures & Dev't. Corp., and Makati Development Corp., Member of the Board of Fort Bonifacio Development Corp. In 2005, Jim was a finalist for the CNBC Asia Business Leader Awards.

Prior to joining ALI, Jim spent 19 years with McKinsey & Company in the US, Mexico, Tokyo, Hong Kong, and Singapore offices. At McKinsey, he was a Director (Global Senior Partner) and played a number of global and regional leadership roles, including that of President of McKinsey's Manila office. He was also a leader of the firm's Asia-Pacific Director Group, which oversaw the firm's 17 offices and 1,200 personnel in Asia. In addition, he was Chairman of the Geographic Development Committee for Southeast Asia, which was responsible for the reputation building, networking, and local development of the five Southeast Asian offices, comprising 200 staff. He chaired the Asian Professional Development Committee, which oversaw the firm's staffing, evaluation, compensation, and training processes and policies in the region. On the knowledge side, Jim was a leader of the firm's Global Business Process Offshoring and Outsourcing practice and part of the Global Leadership Organization Practice practitioner's network. He also founded and headed the Asia-Pacific Energy Practice for several years.

In Asia, he counseled multinational and local clients in Australia, China, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Singapore, Taiwan and Thailand. His clients spanned a broad spectrum of industries, including retail, tourism, real estate, energy, banking, telecommunications, consumer goods, basic industries, and transportation.

Before joining McKinsey, Jim worked at the Hong Kong Resort Company and the Philippine Commercial International Bank.

Throughout his career, Jim has played leadership roles in civic organizations. He is President of the Bonifacio Arts Foundation Inc, which is building a world-class science museum in the Philippines. He is also Chairman of the Hero's Foundation, an organization that provides for the education of the children of Philippine soldiers killed in the line of duty. He is a trustee of the World Wildlife Fund in the Philippines, where he was Chairman of the Programs Committee which oversees the performance and prioritization of WWF's programs. He is also a member of the Young President's Organization, and is a past Chapter Chair of the Philippine Chapter.

He is the Chairman of the Princeton University Alumni Schools Committee in the Philippines, and is a past Chairman of the Harvard Business School Association of the Philippines, and a former VP of the HBS Hong Kong chapter. He is also a founding member of the Asian Public Real Estate Association.

He earned his M.B.A. from Harvard School, graduating with honors in 1988. He completed his undergraduate work in 1984 at Princeton University, where he graduated Magna Cum Laude in Economics.

Jim pursues a number of continuing personal interests. His favorite sports include scuba-diving, golf, volleyball, and alpine skiing. Past-times include multi-media imaging, personal communication and productivity technology and adventure travel. He is married and has three children.





Sari Chang '84

Registered Architect,
New York and New Jersey Member AIA

Sari Chang is an architect, actress and mother of three children, and resides in New York City. She is married to classmate Kevin Guthrie.

At Princeton, Sari received her BA in Architecture. She was a record setting track athlete, specializing in the hurdles and long jump, where she was a three-time first team All-Ivy selection,

Most Valuable Athlete, and qualified for the NCAA Nationals. During a photographic shoot by a fashion magazine on campus, she was “discovered”, launching her on an unexpected modeling career represented by Elite Model Management. Over a period of 6 years she appeared in magazines and catalogues for major brands that enabled her to travel to cities around the world including Paris, Milan, and Tokyo. Her modeling career led to other opportunities in film and entertainment at a time when there were very few Asian Americans in either print or movies. She appeared in “The King of New York” and starred in “China Girl” both directed by Abel Ferrara. After appearing on the Cosby Show, she began working with Bill Cosby and Ken Mok to create and develop a television series pilot about Asian-Americans. She continues to work as a commercial actress represented by Abrams Artists and has numerous commercials to her credit, most recently as a character with Mac and PC in the Apple ad campaign.

Despite her successes in the entertainment business, she returned to architecture, receiving her Masters in Architecture from Yale in 1993. She began working as a designer for Pei, Cobb Freed in 1994, where she worked on the Science and Engineering Quadrangle at Stanford University, the Friend Center for Engineering at Princeton, the Miho Museum in Japan, and the Reagan Building in the Federal Triangle in Washington, DC. In 2000 she worked at Rogers Marvel Architects as the project architect for Kate Spade. Her architecture career was interrupted when her oldest son was diagnosed with leukemia and underwent 3 years of chemotherapy. She established Sari Chang Design, an independent firm, while caring for her son and her two other children. Her firm has done a range of residential and commercial work, including projects for Elite Model Management, PS6 and Hunter College Campus Schools in New York, as well as the re-design of the halftime rooms for the Men’s and Women’s Basketball teams at Princeton.

Sari’s volunteer work reflects her commitment to Princeton and her family’s experience with life-threatening illness. She served on the Trustee Advisory Committee for the design of the new football stadium and was on the board of Friends of Princeton Track. She is currently a member of the Princeton Faculty Advisory Committee on Athletics and is co-chairing Annual Giving Special Gifts for 1984’s 25th Reunion. She is a committee member for the Children’s Cause for Cancer Advocacy and an active volunteer for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society as well as the Make-A-Wish Foundation. She is a licensed architect in NY and NJ, member of the Screen Actors Guild, AFTRA, and the AIA (American Institute of Architects).





Timothy C. Wu '84

Chief Strategy Officer (CSO) of ZeroDivide

Timothy C. Wu is currently the Chief Strategy Officer (CSO) of ZeroDivide, a technology-based social enterprise charitable foundation. Tim oversees external relations, partnership development, and communications. Prior to joining ZeroDivide, he served as the Deputy Director and Program Director of the September 11 Fund in New York City, managing the distribution of over \$500 million in disaster relief assistance. Tim also served as a White House Fellow to US Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala; as a journalist for CBS News, Inc.; an on-air reporter for HK-TVB News in Hong Kong; and Director of Development at CompassPoint Nonprofit Services in San Francisco.

An active volunteer, Tim currently is a board member of the San Francisco Ballet, Sequoia Hospital, Tectonic Theatre Project, and College Track. He is the Immediate Past Chair of the board of KQED/NCPB, Northern California's Public Broadcasting system. He is a former member of the board of Project Inform, Frameline: The International Gay/Lesbian Film Festival, Asian Pacific Islanders in Philanthropy, and a Commissioner of the San Francisco Asian Art Commission. Tim is a summa cum laude graduate of Princeton, a cum laude graduate of Harvard Law School, and was the first Asian-American elected to Princeton's board of trustees.





Vikas Kapoor '84

President and CEO of iQor

Vikas Kapoor is President and CEO of iQor, a global provider of business process outsourcing (BPO) services, employing more than 9,000 people in North America, Europe and Asia. iQor has pioneered innovations in call-center technology and processes, and is one of the fastest-growing companies in the BPO industry. Prior to iQor, he was president and CEO of Delano Technology, a publicly held customer relationship management software company. He previously was president and CEO of Walker Digital, an incubator of

Internet businesses, including priceline.com, and co-founded Mitchell Madison Group, a management consulting firm.

Kapoor speaks frequently about innovation, globalization, private equity, and turnaround management at various global business events, including the World Economic Forum and the Milken Conference. Kapoor is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, the Young Presidents' Organization and Philippine President Gloria Arroyo's International Board of Advisors. Kapoor also serves on the boards of The Metropolitan Opera, Cooper Union and the Rubin Museum of Art. He received a bachelor's degree from Princeton University, a master's degree in philosophy from Harvard University and an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School, where he was a Baker Scholar.





Youngsuk Chi '83

Youngsuk recently became a member of the Management Board of Reed Elsevier PLC and its Director of Global Government Affairs & Corporate Responsibilities. He continues to serve as Vice Chairman of Elsevier since June 2005, prior to which he served as Chairman of Random House Asia and President of Random House Worldwide.

He graduated with an Economics degree and proceeded immediately to Columbia Graduate School of Business where he earned his MBA in finance. After 8 years of international banking career with American Express International Bank in New York, Mexico City, London, Paris and Singapore, he joined the privately-held Ingram Industries for the next 10 years. He spent half of his tenure managing the rapid growth of Ingram Micro in Europe and Asia, and the other half managing various entities of Ingram Book Group in Nashville, TN, including the first-ever print-on-demand book and e-book service called Lightning Source.

In 2001, YS moved to Random House as its President. He is currently a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of Princeton University. He also has served or is currently serving as trustee or director of Princeton University Press, McCarter Theatre, Chair of Schools Committee in Belgium, Tennessee, Korea and Princeton Area, CTNAT (Committee to Nominate Alumni Trustees), CPUC (Council of Princeton University Communities), East Asian Studies Department and Ivy Club Graduate Board. Youngsuk and his wife, Sung, serve on numerous other charitable boards outside of Princeton.
