Against the backdrop of rising student interest in an Asian-American studies program, students interested in the field will have a chance to pursue their interests in a new course next fall. Taught by English professor Anne Cheng, ENG 224: Asian-American Law, Bodies and the Everyday will examine the role of Asian-Americans in American constitutional history, focusing on both specific court cases and how the law affects everyday life. Second Circuit Court of Appeals judge Denny Chin '75 will attend many of the course's meetings and help Cheng teach the course.



### [2\) Portraits of Pride II \(Chinese American Legacies\) Book Donation to Firestone Library](#)

In November 2011, the book, Portraits of Pride II: Chinese American Legacies - First One Hundred Sixty Years in America, was donated to and accepted by Firestone Library. The book, published and donated by the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California, based in Los Angeles Chinatown, is the second volume documenting Chinese Americans who have endured, persevered, and succeeded in the U.S. The first edition is also available from the University archives retrieved via Firestone Library.

The book spotlights Chinese American achievements, especially those who may not have achieved national celebrity. Many entries are about Princeton luminaries or were written by

Princetonians. Once the book was available for check out at Firestone, contributor Professor Sau-Hai (Harvey) Lam '58 was the first to ceremoniously check out the book using his library card.



Stewart Kwoh, founder of the Asian Pacific American Legal Center (APALC) of Southern California, wrote one of the sections and, he quotes extensively from Helen Zia '73's memoir, Asian-American Dreams: The Emergence of an American People. Professor Lam contributed works on Hsien Kei Cheng whose expertise in hypersonic research solved for key problems in reentry aerodynamics and heat transfer, assuring for a safe return of the Apollo moon astronauts and Princeton graduate schoolmate Prof. Chang-Lin Tien '59 who served for seven years as the chancellor of the University of California at Berkeley, University Trustee, and Madison Medal winner in 2000.

Another section of note is Dr. James Wei's "Making It in America," which humorously details his twists and turns to becoming Princeton's Dean of Engineering and Applied Science. One notable Princeton scientist is Dr. C.S. Wu '48, called "the world's foremost experimental physicist" by Princeton President Robert Goheen '40 '47 '48. Dr. C.S. Wu '48 taught at Princeton from 1942 - 44, and in 1958 Princeton awarded her an Honorary Doctorate of Science, the first woman recipient of the award.

Yet another section describes a mathematician who graduated from Princeton at a young age with his PhD in 1996: Dr. Terence Tao '96 won the Field Medal, the equivalent to the Nobel Prize in Mathematics. Lastly, there is a section on Maya Lin, the world renowned architect, designer of the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC and was a Princeton visiting lecturer. As you can see, this book is in many ways as much about Princeton as it is about the larger history of Chinese Americans in America.

Through the generous contributions of supporters, the CHSSC plans to distribute 20,000 copies of POP II, to libraries throughout America. The gift comes as an inspiration and a call to Princeton students and community to turn their attention to Asian American history, its importance to Princeton and to our nation.
